RECEPTION

Reception have had a brilliant term learning about our topic 'Under the Sea'. We have been reading the story 'Rainbow Fish' and talking about different sea creatures from this story, how we can be kind to our friends and the importance of sharing. Reception have created their own Sea creatures which have been displayed in our role play cabin. We have been learning about submarines and what they are used for and we followed instructions on how to draw a Submarine and they were fantastic!

We have been investigating Magnets and how they work. We explored this by trying to catch magnetic fish with our Magnets.

Reception have also been looking at colour mixing and have been very creative at mixing primary colours together to make different colours.

In Maths the children have been learning about Capacity and they have learnt the terms 'full', 'half full', 'nearly full', 'nearly empty' and 'empty'. The children used the water tray to demonstrate their knowledge.

Reception have been learning lots of new sounds in Phonics and have been doing well at segmenting and blending CVC words. We have been working hard at our letter formation and using our Fred fingers to spell words too!

<u>YEAR 1</u>

Year 1 have loved reading our key text 'Traction Man' this half term and have produced some excellent writing using adjectives as well as writing sentences using exclamation marks. After reading the whole story Year 1 were able to write their own short narrative using first, next, then, and finally. In Science Year 1 have continued to learn more about materials and have been investigating which materials are the most absorbent as well as which materials can be recycled. We found out that the sponge and fabric were the most absorbent and that lots of different materials including paper, plastic and glass can be recycled and re-used to make new things. We have enjoyed our new History topic learning about 'Building Bridges' and used the iPads to research the Mersey Gateway Bridge. We found out how bridges are built and that bridges are made from strong material. This topic linked to our D&T project of designing and building a bridge. Year 1 were fantastic engineers and were able to use different materials to build their own bridge.

Well done for all your hard work this half term Year 1.













<u>YEAR 2</u>

Year 2 have really enjoyed learning about our class story 'One Day on our Blue Planet.' We have loved reading the story and researching all about the African Savannah and its animals. Year 2 have used iPads and the computer to carry out their own research – this was so much fun! Throughout our science topic, the children have been learning about 'Living things and their Habitats.' Not only have we been learning in the classroom, we have also been in the woods and around our school grounds exploring living things. Our favourite thing that we did this term was going on a worm hunt.

We sang and danced down the corridor before exploring our woodlands and finding some AMAZING worms. Year 2 are excited to continue learning about new things after half term.







YEAR 3

Year 3 have really enjoyed their 'Victorian Era' topic this half term. We have learned lots about what life was like living in this period, and how difficult it was for families who were poor. Children from poor families would have to go out to work to earn money from the age of 6 years, working very long hours and often in very unhealthy and dangerous conditions just to survive. We compared their lives to children of wealthy Victorian families and to living as a child in current times.

We also looked at some notable figures from the Victorian Era including Dr Barnardo, a benevolent man who set up his 'Ragged Schools' to provide free education for children too poor to receive it elsewhere, and whose charity still exists today. We have also studied the designer William Morris, learning about his famous furniture and fabric design that is still used all over the world today.

All of this history has been brought to life whilst reading our English text 'Oliver Twist' by Charles Dickens – it's fair to say the children have been enthralled by the story of the poor orphan Oliver and his life.

Other highlights this half term have included our cricket lessons where we have learned how to throw, bowl, bat, wicket-keep and field with increasing skill and our fantastic class assembly celebrating Chinese New Year.





<u>YEAR 4</u>

During this half-term, Year 4 have been working super hard and have had lots of fun learning all about the rise of the Roman Empire. This included us understanding who the Romans were and where they came from, the Roman invasion in Britain and famous rulers of the Roman Empire. In art, we researched Roman mosaics and had a go designing and making our very own. We even explored the outdoors during our forest school lessons, searching for mosaics on the school grounds and gathering materials to make an outdoor mosaic. During our science lessons, we have been learning all about states of matter. We looked at how matter makes up our planet and the whole universe and how, on Earth, all matter exists in one of three main states: solid, liquid or gas. We really did enjoy investigating how, depending on its temperature, matter can change state; heating, cooling, evaporating, and condensation are ways in which a material changes state.



<u>YEAR 5</u>

This half term, we started our swimming lessons and are making super progress.







In Science we have enjoyed researching friction by investigating whose shoe is the most slippy?



We are also making super progress with our tennis lessons.

Finally, we have immersed ourselves in the fabulous book: 'Kensuke's Kingdom' by Michael Morpurgo. This is an adventurous story about a young boy who becomes stranded on a desert island and befriends an old Japanese man. Both characters learn a lot from each other – Michael teaches Kensuke how to speak English, and Kensuke teaches Michael how to paint and fish. The ending is very moving as both characters part company. Here is a sample of Japanese writing, by Scarlett.


One Way System

HPAN (Halton Primary Arts Network)


We are proud to announce that Our Lady's has taken part in the Halton Primary Arts exhibition in Runcorn Shopping Centre, again this year.
