# Reception

This term Reception have been focusing on the Farm.

We have read the stories; What The Ladybird Heard, The Little Red Hen and Wake Up Time On Bumble Farm.

Through these texts the children learnt about different farm animals and what their babies are called. The children also learnt about the different roles of a farmer, different fruit and vegetables that can grow on farms, different farm vehicles and the noises that the animals make.



In maths the children have been learning about numbers to 20 and how we can make these numbers. They have also been learning about different 3D shapes and making their own number sentences using addition and subtraction. The children really enjoyed learning about doubles and they independently did this during continuous provision and they completed work on odd and even numbers.



## Reception





We celebrated Rock Kidz and we had a superb day dressed up as Rockstars. We also had a fantastic day on our school trip to Imagine That! The children demonstrated outstanding behaviour during this trip and we are so proud of them.

We can't wait for another exciting term!

Year 1 have been learning all about 'The Arctic' this half term and finding out what animals live in the Arctic as well as learning about the different climates around the world. Children loved being weather reporters and talking about the weather in the UK, the Amazon Rainforest and the Arctic, as well as recognising hot and cold areas of the world. We have enjoyed reading our key text 'Winter Sleep' and learnt lots about hibernation and which animals hibernate and why they do so in the winter. Year 1 have also been writing about the hibernation of a dormouse, comparing the secret glade in the season of summer and winter, as well as creating their own narrative of the story 'Winter Sleep'.








Year 1 have really enjoyed their art and music lessons this half term. In music, children have been learning to play different notes on the glockenspiel and learning about pulse, rhythm and pitch. Children were fantastic singing and performing different songs and are becoming more confident improvising and composing a song using musical instruments.

In Art, children have been learning about primary and secondary colours and have been experimenting with different thickness paint brushes. Year 1 created some beautiful Arctic landscapes in the style of David McEown.

Well done for all your excellent work this half term Year 1.



This half term Year 2 have loved their forest school sessions. It has been wonderful to see them all engaging with the outdoors. We have completed maths activities outside, and we have also created micro-habitats linked to our science lessons. In maths, we have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. The children have had lots of fun exploring the different shapes and their properties.





Our geography topic has been about the seaside, and we have been looking specifically at Llandudno. The children have really enjoyed researching the seaside town and recently created their own tourism leaflets for Llandudno.









Year 2 went on a trip to Gillmoss Discovery Centre in Liverpool and it was a very fun, interactive and informative morning. We have been learning about algorithms in our computing sessions and the children had a fantastic time creating their own games using algorithms.



Year 2 have had another busy and successful half term, and they have all continued to work hard and try their best! Well done Year 2.





Year 3 have really enjoyed their 'Victorian Era' topic this half term. We have learned lots about what life was like living in this period, and how difficult it was for families who were poor. Children from poor families would have to go out to work to earn money from the age of 6 years, just to survive. We looked at the differences between rich and poor lifestyles and some of the terrible and dangerous jobs Victorian children had to do such as: working as chimney sweeps, factory workers, bird scarers, street sellers and domestic servants. We also compared life in Victorian times with our lives today, noting the things and inventions that have endured such as train travel, seaside holidays, lightbulbs and electricity, the telephone and the flushing toilet!



All of this history was brought to life whilst reading our English text 'Oliver Twist' by Charles Dickens – it's fair to say the children have been enthralled by the story of the poor orphan Oliver and his life and enjoyed participating in some role play for some of the memorable parts of the book.

We also looked at some notable figures from the Victorian Era including Dr Barnardo, a benevolent man who set up his 'Ragged Schools' to provide free education for children too poor to receive it elsewhere, and whose charity still exists today. We have also studied the designer William Morris, learning about his famous furniture and fabric design that is still used all over the World today.

After our super concert last term, we were lucky enough to have Mrs McElroy continue to teach us singing and we have really enjoyed these sessions, learning about music and singing some beautiful songs including a special song to celebrate the Catholic Church's Jubilee year.



We have really enjoyed our science lessons, learning all about light and shadows and working scientifically to determine how a shadow changes depending on how close it is to the light.

Finally, we have loved our rugby lessons where we have learned how to throw, catch, pass and kick as well as developing great listening and team working skills. A massive thank you to Sean from Widnes Vikings for the fantastic lessons and coaching.

In P.E. we have been extremely lucky to have the opportunity to work with Widnes Vikings, learning the skills it takes to participate in playing rugby-playing fun, fast paced games. Sean is an excellent coach and made all our rugby sessions so much fun.



Our history topic has been about the 'Saxon King'. We have thoroughly enjoyed exploring and learning about the inspirational story of Harold Godwinson, the final Anglo-Saxon King of England. Linking in with this topic, in English we have been reading the epic poem, Beowulf. We have loved learning about this mythical story, making wanted posters and writing character descriptions. This then led to us creating our very own Beowulf inspired mythical story.

We have had a busy, yet rewarding half term in Year 5. In our Egyptian topic, we have been learning all about the wonders of Ancient Egypt. We presented some of our research, such as the structure of Egyptian society, on pyramid shaped fact files!



We have been creative with clay, making our own Canopic jars. These were used during the mummification process, and contained the deceased Pharaoh's internal organs! We decorated our jars in hieroglyphics – Egyptian writing.





Inspired by our core text 'Ma'at's Feather' set in Ancient Egypt, we wrote our own Egyptian adventure stories. Did you know that the Egyptians believed that when you died your heart was weighed against Ma'at's feather? If your heart was as light as a feather you could pass onto the afterlife.


