


Reception

Reception have had a lovely first half term at Our Lady's. They have all settled in excellently and have really enjoyed all the activities and lessons we have been doing.

We have been learning about patterns, matching, sorting, size, height and length in Maths and the children have had lots of fun completing activities around these topics. We have also been learning Phonics and practicing our letter formations in different ways. Reception have loved our topic 'Ourselves'. We have been learning about who is in our family, where we live, how to look after ourselves, which foods are healthy and unhealthy, our senses and how we use them and we have been making portraits with lots of different resources.

Year 1 have really enjoyed the topic 'Unity in the Community' this first half term. They have been learning about their local area and finding out where Widnes is on Google maps as well as having fun being weather reporters talking about the weather in Widnes.

In Science, the children have also enjoyed learning outside the classroom and going into the forest to learn about plants and seasonal changes. They now know the difference between deciduous and evergreen trees and can name some of the trees in our school forest.

In English Year 1 have enjoyed reading the storybook 'The Bog Baby' and have been doing lots of descriptive writing about the Bog Baby and describing the pond where the Bog Baby lives. When we went into the forest, we were amazed to find the Bog Baby living in our school forest. Children have really enjoyed this story and were able to complete their own narrative writing to re-tell key parts of the story using the words first, next, then and after that.

Well done for all your hard work this half term Year 1.









Year 2 have really enjoyed their topic 'NESW' this half term. We have been looking at compass directions and we had lots of fun creating our own treasure maps. As part of our topic, we have also been learning about our local area, so we planned a route to Ditton Library. We followed our directions to the Library and enjoyed looking at our local area during the walk! The children's behaviour on our walk and in Ditton Library was excellent as always!









Journey to Greece

Year 3 have enjoyed our topic 'Journey to Greece' this half term learning all about ancient and modern Greece. We have been transfixed by the Greek myths and tales we have learned about whilst studying our English book as well as the history and traditions of this ancient land. We learned that ancient Greece was a very powerful empire between 2000 BC and 146 BC and was responsible for introducing democracy, as well as many new ideas for government, science, philosophy and art.

We also compared two cities that existed in ancient times (Athens and Sparta) and looked at their similarities and differences, observing what it would be like to grow up there.

We have listened to traditional Greek music and had a go at dancing the 'Hasapiko'. The highlight of our half term has been our Greek food tasting lesson, combining learning about healthy eating in science as trying some yummy Greek food.





During this half term, Year 4 have thoroughly enjoyed exploring the topics within our 'Lightning Speed' theme. We have looked at many things, a popular one being our science topic, electricity. The children have participated in many investigations. They have made their own simple circuits, identifying complete and incomplete circuits. Their inquiries have also helped them recognise the difference between conductors and insulators. One of their favourite investigations was observing how long a battery powered a bulb for. They had so much fun recording their finding and writing explanations as to why the battery lasted as long as it did.






This first half term has been quite eventful for us.

To complement our space topic - Mission Control, we read the entertaining book Cosmic by Frank Cottrell Boyce, which is all about a group of children who go to space on a secret mission. Whilst reading this book, we actually got to meet the famous author and hear all about his life as a writer, as well as hearing him read from his latest book 'Noah's Gold'.

We now have our own signed copies of a range of his books!

Over the past term, Year 6 have been learning the skills and attitudes required to be Play Leaders. After a few weeks of training they have shown how they can encourage others, develop games to make them easier or more challenging, create healthy competition in games and, most of all, have fun! After half term, our Play Leaders will practice their newfound skills with Key Stage 1 helping the younger children develop their own skills.







Health & Safety

A huge thank you to PCSO Steve Marnick who visited our school to talk about ways to have fun but stay safe this Halloween and Bonfire Night. He explained about the laws for the selling and using fireworks but also talked to the children about being good citizens and considering their neighbours who are old and who may not enjoy Halloween. Dyslexia is a learning difficulty which primarily affects reading and writing skills. However, it does not only affect these skills. Dyslexia is actually about information processing. Dyslexic people may have difficulty processing and remembering information they see and hear, which can affect learning and the acquisition of literacy skills. Dyslexia can also impact on other areas such as organisational skills.

It is important to remember that there are positives to thinking differently. Many dyslexic people show strengths in areas such as reasoning and in visual and creative fields.

During Dyslexia Awareness Week 2022 Year 6 read a poem written by a child who has dyslexia. We discussed what it would be like for children and adults who are diagnosed with this lifelong learning difficulty and found out about famous people who have been diagnosed with dyslexia including Abi Elphinstone, the author of Sky Song, the book Year 6 are currently reading.

We are pleased to announce that Our Lady's School has organised a clothes & shoe collection with Bag2School in order to raise much needed funds for our school.

Bag2School is the UK's leading textile recycler and fundraiser working with schools and since its inception in 2001 it has now paid out over £36 million.

As well as raising vitally needed funds for Our Lady's it also helps the environment by helping to divert unwanted textiles away from landfill. A recent DEFRA report has shown that textile collection schemes are helping to reduce the volume of textiles discarded as municipal solid waste. However it is a fact that as a nation we still send 350,000 tonnes of textiles to landfill every year.
