Newsletter – w/e 24th May 2024

Reception

This term Reception have been learning about different types of animals, mostly farm animals through our story 'What the Ladybird heard'. They have completed lots of fun and engaging activities based around the book. The children have been practicing their sentence writing using capital letters, finger spaces and full stops and they are progressing well with this.

In Maths they have been introduced to money and they have been sorting coins into the correct groups; 5p, 10p, 2p, 1p, 20p and 50p. The children have also been looking at numbers that make 20 and they have been using different manipulatives to help them do this. They have also been looking at Odd and Even numbers and have been consolidating their knowledge by sorting the ladybirds into the correct hoop.

The children have spent a lot of time outside this term, and they have had lots of fun in the water area, sand area and mud kitchen. They have been enjoying our new outdoor writing area and they have been doing lots of creative and imaginative writing and role play there. Taking on the role of a teacher at the whiteboard, writing shopping lists with the colourful pens and drawing designs of what they are going to build in the Construction area. They have also been working on their gross motor skills on the jungle gym and the progress that the children have made on this is amazing since September!













Year 1 have been learning all about 'The Arctic' this half term and finding out what animals live in the Arctic as well as learning about the different climates around the world. Children loved being weather reporters and talking about the weather in the UK, the Amazon Rainforest, and the Arctic, as well as recognising hot and cold areas of the world. We have enjoyed reading our key text 'Winter Sleep' and learnt lots about hibernation and which animals hibernate and why. The children have been writing about the hibernation of a dormouse, comparing the secret glade in the season of Summer and Winter, as well as creating their own narrative of the story 'Winter Sleep'.

Year 1 have really enjoyed their Art and Music (Charanga) lessons this half term. In Music, children have been learning to play different notes on the glockenspiel and learning about pulse, rhythm, and pitch. Children were fantastic singing and performing different songs and are becoming more confident improvising and composing a song using musical instruments. In Art, children have been learning about primary and secondary colours and have been experimenting with different thickness paint brushes. Year 1 created some beautiful Arctic landscapes in the style of David McEown.

Well, done for all your excellent work this half term Year 1.















This half term Year 2 have loved their forest school sessions. It has been wonderful to see them all engaging with the outdoors. We have completed maths activities outside, and we have also created micro-habitats linked to our science lessons. In Maths, we have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. The children have had lots of fun exploring the different shapes and their properties. Our geography topic has been about the seaside, and we have been looking specifically at Llandudno. The children have really enjoyed researching this seaside town and recently created their own tourism leaflets for Llandudno. We have been learning about algorithms in our computing sessions and the children had a fantastic time creating their own games using algorithms. Year 2 have had another busy and successful half term, and they have all continued to work really hard and try their best! Well done, Year 2.



Year 3 have really enjoyed their 'Victorian Era' topic this half term. We have learned lots about what life was like living in this period, and how difficult it was for families who were poor. Children from poor families would have to go out to work to earn money from the age of 6 years, just to survive. We looked at the differences between rich and poor lifestyles and some of the terrible and dangerous jobs Victorian children had to do such as working as chimney sweeps, factory workers, bird scarers, street sellers and domestic servants. We also compared life in Victorian times with our lives today, noting the things and inventions that have endured such as train travel, seaside holidays, lightbulbs and electricity, the telephone, and the flushing toilet!

All of this history was brought to life whilst reading our English text 'Oliver Twist' by Charles Dickens – it's fair to say the children have been enthralled by the story of the poor orphan Oliver and his life and enjoyed participating in some role play for some of the memorable parts of the book.







We also looked at some notable figures from the Victorian Era including Dr Barnardo, a benevolent man who set up his 'Ragged Schools' to provide free education for children too poor to receive it elsewhere, and whose charity still exists today. We have also studied the designer William Morris, learning about his famous furniture and fabric design that is still used all over the World today. For our DT project we learned to cross stitch (a hobby that rich Victorians used to enjoy) and mastered this skill through patience, perseverance and helping each other. We were so proud and delighted with the keyring trinkets we made for our families and rightly so!

Our music and computing lessons were great fun too. Our music topic was all about singing and performing and we had the opportunity to visit Reception class and perform the song we had learned. In computing we used technology to learn about stop motion animation and made our own short animations using characters and settings we had made.





We have really enjoyed our science lessons, learning all about light and shadows and working scientifically to determine how a shadow changes depending on how close it is to the light.





Finally, we have loved our rugby lessons where we have learned how to throw, catch, pass and kick as well as developing great listening and team working skills.

A massive thank you to Sean and Dylan from Widnes Vikings for the fantastic lessons and coaching.



Our history topic has been about the 'Saxon King'. We have thoroughly enjoyed exploring and learning about the inspirational story of Harold Godwinson, the final Anglo-Saxon King of England. A lesson we particularly enjoyed was when we were put into groups and had to research the different candidates' claim to the throne after Edward the Confessor died. Each group put together a speech where we aimed to convince the Witan Council to choose their claimant. We had so much fun planning and delivering these speeches and deciding who would be the next King of England.












<u>Yr 5</u>








In George's story below: who are the Manticores? Were the 'Sphinx' a mythical group? Look out for future stories written by George – available in all good book shops in...... the future!








Rock Kidz!

Snacks must be booked by midnight the night before and dinners can be booked 2 weeks in advance.








