

Reflection

During this week we have been blessed to have the opportunity to hear the First Confessions of our children who are preparing for their First Holy Communion. What a great occasion to see these young people saying sorry and openly accepting God's mercy. But what about the remainder of us...?

At the heart of confession is our relationship and that important conversation with Christ. We see this same type of conversation and forgiveness in many of the parables but especially when Jesus meets the woman at the well. He carries this conversation on with each one of us, gently forming our hearts to love God and our neighbour. This intimate conversation is one that takes place in many ways, not simply in words but in our actions as well. The sacrament of confession is one of the most powerful tools given to the Church for the sake of our continued healing and freeing us from sin and anything that blocks our relationship with others, but mostly importantly with the Lord.

Some people shy away from considering their sins as they are sometimes too difficult to admit, or we are ashamed of them. It is true that we are all called to live in the joy and peace of the Lord, but taking time with our own thoughts and accepting our vulnerability and weakness allows the mercy of God to become apparent to us, and to realise the love that God has for us, even in our sin.

In the parable of the Prodigal Son the Lord's love is expressed through the lavish welcome that the Father has for his son when he returns home. Let's not shy away from returning home to the Father regardless of what we are carrying or what we may have done. Therefore, although we may enter confession in sorrow knowing our unworthiness, we are restored in God's image by the forgiveness of God the Father and leave in the joy and peace of God's children.
